YOU MUST ASK QUESTIONS!

Parties have waited for this hearing

You can ask questions at any point during the hearing

Helps to write out questions ahead of time

Can ask a question that was already asked during the investigation

You're accessing credibility

Asking Questions

When might decision-makers ask questions? Administrative Resolution meetings Equity hearings Title IX hearings



Practice Pointers

Ask for definitions of colloquialisms such as "hooking up," "making out," "cuddling," "belligerent"

(i) Ask about things you don't understand (snapchat, dating apps)

Avoid compound questions

Know elements of alleged violations and focus on questioning those issues

Ask hard questions in a non-accusatory way

Instead of "Why didn't you report this right away?"

Try: "What brought you to report at this time?" OR, "Did you consider reporting after the incident? Why or why not?"



Think About

What do I need to know?

Why do I need to know it? (i.e. is it relevant?)

What is the best way to ask the question? (i.e. How can I phrase the question appropriately?)

A little bit of planning goes a long way!



<u>Open-ended</u> – Calls for narrative or recall ex: "What happened after you left the bar?"

<u>Focused</u> – Directs the witness to a particular issue ex: "You said you woke up because you felt her touching you. Please tell us more about that."

Types of Questions

<u>Multiple Choice</u> – Provides a range of options ex: "Were your clothes on, off, or some other way?"

<u>Yes/No</u> – Seeks to clarify a specific point ex: "You said you went to her apartment from the bar. Did she drive you there?"

<u>Leading</u> – Assumes the answer ex: "She drove you to her apartment, correct?"
